



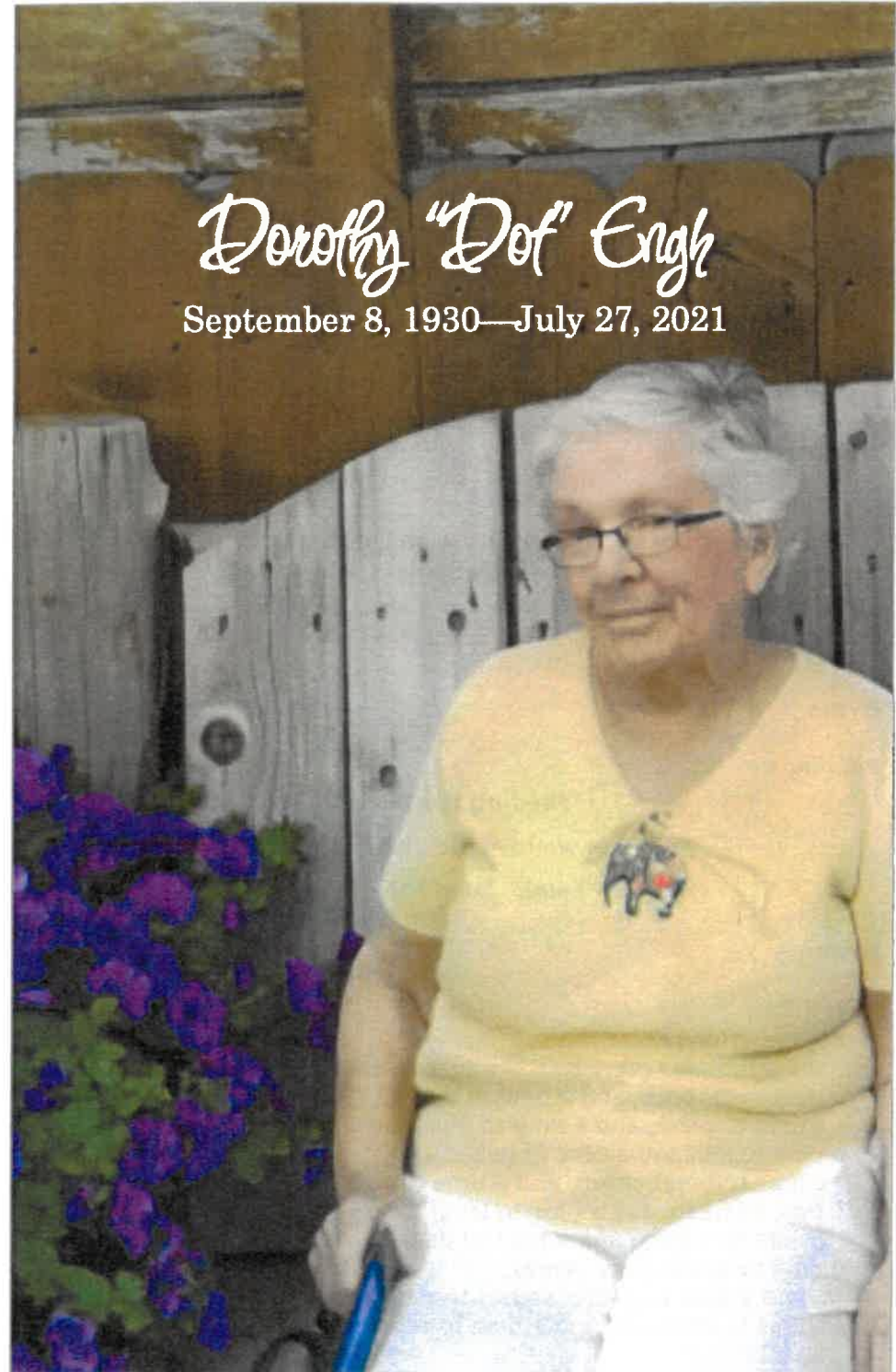

Dorothy "Dot" Engh

Age 90



Dorothy, aka Dot, enjoyed feeding the birds, tending to her flowers and vegetable garden, loved celebrating birthdays with family and with friends at the Birthday Club. An avid weather tracker and armchair traveler that followed her family members as they set out on adventures, she also loved solving puzzles, quilting and needlepoint but her greatest hobby was celebrating and honoring the old ways and she was particularly fond of collecting antiques... always sharing, "it's all about the hunt!"

She loved growing up on her parents Erik and Helen Sand's farm in Emerado, North Dakota with her three brothers Floyd, Lawrence and Stan and her three sisters Edith, Marian and Phylis. She captured the highlights in her 1995 book called Memories.

Education was always important in the Sand family. Dorothy graduated from Central High in Grand Forks and received her BA in Home Economics from NDSU in Fargo.

She taught Home Economics at Felton High School and later enjoyed her work at The Daisy Gift Shop.

Dorothy was married to Randy Engh for 62 years, a lover of the outdoors, music and furniture restoration and he was a longtime engineering manager at Control Data. Randy passed away in 2015. Their eldest daughter, Barb, holds a doctorate and lectures on critical and culture theory at the University of Leeds in the UK. Their middle daughter, Betsy is a retired Pediatric Nurse Practitioner. She is married to Steven Trevathan who is a retired Urologist. They live in Murray, Kentucky and have four children, John, Sam, Mady and Libby. Dorothy and Randy's youngest daughter, Jenny, was very active in politics working in the White House during the Regan Administration and later serving in the Minnesota government. She passed away in 2012.

Dorothy was also known for her determination and not easily changing her mind once she had set her plans or thoughts in motion. An example where Dorothy did not want to give up her rotary phone long after technology had moved on comes to mind. Even in her later years as she struggled with her health and approached her 90th birthday, her frequent comment was "I've got plans!".

Most of all, Dorothy loved her family and friends and often created a little magic for them that made them feel special, whether it was their birthday, a beautiful holiday meal and table, or just putting the kettle on and sharing one of her homemade pies during a welcomed visit. She is smiling down at everyone that took the time to be here to celebrate her life.
